# Program: South African Plants with an Emphasis on Lithops

Doug Dawson

Doug is a retired math professor and does extensive botanical travels to areas of the world where succulents grow. These include Mexico, Chile, Argentina, Yemen, Soccotra, and Africa as well as Arizona. In recent years, he has organized 8 bo-



tanical exploratory trips to South Africa and Namibia, camping on local farms and public areas by night and exploring the surrounding mountains and hills by day.

For many years, one of his key interests has been seed-growing of cacti and succulents. Other interests are photography and PowerPoint presentations with succulent content. He has delivered many workshops and speaking engagements in Arizona and other states.

To aid in his travels, he has a background in languages. These include German and French. Nowadays Afrikaans has become a much more useful language for him in rural South African areas.

Doug's private plant collection has an emphasis on seedlings, lithops, other mesembs, Arizona natives, and other cacti. He is a member of the CSSA, Central Arizona Cactus and Succulent Society, the Tucson Cactus and Succulent Society, and the Desert Botanical Garden.

## **COPIAPOA**

A cactus that is easy to grow and that blooms readily (as long as you like yellow flowers) is one in the genus <u>Copiapoa</u>, native to the Atacama Desert of northern Chile. They have been, for me, easily grown from seed or cuttings and not at all prone to rot, accepting regular watering in warm weather even though



they are native to one of the driest regions on the planet. There are about two dozen species. Most cluster readily but stay low; I have seen photos of plants in habitat that have grown into huge, sprawling masses, always close to the ground; judging by the growth rate of my cultivated plants, which are <u>not</u> huge after 30 years of regular feeding and watering, those habitat plants must be very old indeed. They are named for the Chilean city of Copiapó, which is near their native area.

Their heads are generally 3-4 inches across, usually quite spiny. <u>C. laui</u> is the smallest, spreading into a sort of ground cover, with very short spines. Many retreat into the ground to some extent; this probably helps their survival in their very dry desert, where there is hardly any rainfall and the moisture comes from fog. <u>C. tenuissima</u> is described in one of my cactus books as being "dull green," but my plants are a very handsome black, very striking to look at with white wool and showy yellow flowers; the plants cluster readily but never get very large. <u>C. krainziana</u> has white spines, and seems to be less inclined to bloom than other species that I grow, but it is a handsome plant nonetheless. <u>C. haseltoniana</u> (named for a former editor of the Cactus and Succulent Journal) and *C. cinerea*

are somewhat alike, with gray-green, somewhat waxy bodies. <u>C. hypogaea</u> is always small; the name means "underground," which describes the way it grows; you could walk over it and hardly notice, as it is almost spineless. It's a nice little plant just the same, with the bright yellow flowers that are characteristic of the genus.

Cultivation of *Copiapoas* is pretty much like that for most cacti: good drainage, strong light; I do not water any desert cacti between November and March. I cannot speak for their hardiness to frost, but I would guess that they could stand low temperatures if kept dry.
