he show area should be set up and ready for your show plants by 3:00pm on Friday, the 10th of February. I will be there to give assistance to those who need it until they close the gates around 9:00pm. I recommend that you bring your plants in on Friday to avoid the mad rush Saturday morning. On Saturday morning you may bring in your plants starting at 8:00am when the gates open till 10:30am. This will give me half an hour to do final adjustments. The show will be in the courtyard, same as last year. Judging will begin at 11:00am and should take about an hour or so to complete. The judging will be an open forum where you can listen to the judges comments. This is a great way to learn about how and why the judges make their decisions. This is very informative. The judges will be Mark Fryer and Kelly Griffin. Pots will be given for the three novice awards in addition to the rosettes. Plaques will be presented to all winners at the next meeting in March. The plaques will have your name, the name of previous winners and a picture of your winning plant. The show ends at 4:00pm, please be there to retrieve your plants at that time. # Recipe For Watering your Plants Chris Miller and Ric Newcomer



Last June I attended an event at **Ric & Marilyn Newcomer's** home (which all of you will be invited to this June in our <u>Coffee in the Garden Program</u>). At that event I learned that **Ric** had his own watering system. I have been using the same system since the end of June 2011 and have really seen positive results. So here is the recipe for successful watering.

#### Ingredients:

- A 35 gallon trash can ("Brute" brand is best)
- A set of wheels for trash can (optional, but necessary if you paln to move it
- A ¼ hp sump pump (submergible, with float)
- Two 25 foot lengths of ½ inch Water Works hose
- A watering wand (with shut off and adjustable settings)

All these supplies are available at Home Depot or Lowes. Make sure the sump pump has a connection for ½ inch hose or you will be back buying PVC piping to make it fit.

Put the sump pump in the bottom of the trash can. Attach the hose and wand. Fill the trash can with water.

Warning: Do not plug in the sump pump until you are ready to water.

Once the trash can is full of water add any of the following:

- vinegar: 1 teaspoon of white distilled vinegar per gallon of water. This is for bringing the PH of the water to an agreeable level for the plants
- fertilizer: 1 teaspoon of liquidnox Grow 10-10-10 or Bloom 0-10-10, per gallon of water (Ric's recommendation)
- anti bug treatment (per directions on box)

Plug in the pump, wait for the line to fill, adjust the wand to the setting of your choice, open the valve on the wand and start watering, Ric goes through 8 barrels to do his "complete" yard. I use about 6.

Ric has been using this system for at least 20 years with great success, he uses it on ALL the plants in his yard. I use it on all the plants except the ones on the upper hill

Your plants will love you for pampering them and it will show.

# Library Report Don Hunt



In the spirit of something for everyone, our new book selections are surely worth a look. First up, "The Bushman Candles" by Charles Craib and John Lavranos. As our programs to Namibia tell us, these are highly adapted plants referred to as both Monsonia and Sarcocaulon. They are called bushman candles because their adaptation has the living tissue of the stem surrounded by a resinous layer that burns green right


out of the ground. This book is everything I look for in a botanical ref-


erence for my own collection. First it's on a narrow enough subject to be considered complete. At least for now! It's on a sufficiently obscure topic that the information isn't going to be presented anywhere else. There are habitat photos, range maps and culture information. The book also has information and pictures of plants that grow in association with Sarcocaulon Best of all, some really beautiful artwork by some of the best botanical artists today. Reading a book like this is really helpful in attempting to keep alive plants that naturally grow in such hostile environments.

Second up is a good general information book, "The Timber Press Guide to Succulent Plants of the World" by Fred Dortort. While not strictly a picture book like the old standard Succulent Illustrated Dictionary, there are lots of pictures and the chapters are in layman's language and full of useful and interesting information. Fred gives us 30 chapters of succulent groupings, a good overview and especially recommended to neophytes. I suspect this book will get frequent use.

Also new to our collection is the "Succulent Plants of the Canary Islands." It's bulkier than you'd think because it's all in four languages. Absolutely essential if you're planning a trip to the Canary Islands or have a freak on for aeoniums. A generally interesting book, well written and again comprehensive of its topic.

Be sure and stop by the library table and take a look!




## Flibet's corner

# Eat Your Weedies

CHEF SEAN BAKER of GATHER, a restaurant in Berkeley, California, provided this recipe for purslane, an invasive succulent that grows wild throughout most of the United States. If you can't find any in your yard, check out specialty-food stores and Latino markets. —K.B.

## **Purslane Salad With Roasted Root Vegetables**

(serves four)

Start with 3 cups of celery root and 3 cups of peeled sunchokes, chopped into <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>" pieces. Toss with **salt** and **olive oil** and roast in a 325-degree oven for 30 to 45 minutes until soft, rotating as needed. Cool to room temperature and dump into a big bowl with 3 cups of washed, chopped purslane. Toss in 3 tablespoons of toasted pine nuts, 1 table-spoon of chopped fresh thyme, and 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tablespoons of chopped fresh parsley. Flavor with a mix of 3 tablespoons of lemon juice and 6 tablespoons of olive oil. Add salt and fresh ground pepper to taste, grate pecorino cheese on top, and serve.

First, Second, and Third Place Ribbons will be awarded in all categories for both Novice and Advanced entrants.

#### **RULES**

- 1) Participants must be members of the SDCSS.
- 2) Entries must be in the possession of exhibitors for at least six months. Plants must be clean, (no weeds or debris), healthy (no insects, disease or pesticide odor) and dry. Plant labels should be removed or hidden. Exhibitors are responsible for placing entry cards with plants prior to judging. The show committee may remove any entry that distracts from or jeopardizes the health of other entries.
- 3) Plants must be individually potted specimens except category #63, Dish Gar-
- 4) Depending on number of entries, prior to judging, the show committee may combine or divide categories and rearrange entries. The show area will be open to observers during judging. Plants must remain until end of show.
- 5) Entries are judged on:
  - a) Condition, size, maturity and difficulty of culture: 70%
  - b) Staging pot, top dressing, arrangement, cleanliness: 25%s
  - c) Nomenclature: 5%
  - Awards are given only if the judges believe they are merited, and all decisions are final.
- 6) The SDCSS and show committee will take due care to safeguard entries but cannot be held responsible for damage to, or loss of, plants and property.





