



Plant of the Month "Acacias, an Overview" Erik Gronborg



The genus Acacia (now they are at it again, considering breaking the genus into 3 separate genera) includes more than 750 species of small shrubs and ground covers to large trees as tall as 200 feet. Even though they are not succulents, they should be of interest to you because they are xerophytic and are found in many of the hot and dry parts of the tropic and sub

tropic areas of the world, the same places where we find cacti and other succulents. They are in the pea family (Leguminosae). Acacias have yel-

low flowers, ranging from almost white to yellow-orange, looking like small round or cylindrical puff balls, many of them fragrant. From late January to March we can see Acacias turn solid yellow throughout San Diego county. Being in the pea family, the seeds come in numerous shapes of pea pods. Acacia





trees typically have feathery

or fern like bipinnate leaves with many small leaflets, except for many of the Australian species where the leaves have been replaced with phyllodes, that is expanded leaf stalks.

Almost all Acacia trees outside Australia have thorns, from straight, up to four inches long, to small, sharp, and hooked. A small group from Central America have thick hollow thorns, which are inhabited by ants.

Most Acacia species are in Australia, but there are smaller groups in southern Africa and south and central America, including some in the Sonoran desert. The two best known, which can be

seen in Anza Borrego are *Acacia farnesiana* and *A. greggii* (the cat's claw Acacia)

Some Acacias provide useful products. In addition to firewood and fence posts, two African species have for centuries provided Gum Arabic. A few have attractive wood used for furniture, the most important being the Hawaiian Koa wood.

Almost all the ornamental Acacia trees grown in San Diego gardens and nurseries come from Australia. A few of them:

Acacia longifolia, the most common, a small, fast growing bushy tree.

Acacia redolens, fast growing prostate shrub used as a ground cover along freeways.

Acacia baileyana, graceful tree with fern like leaves. One variety, A. baileyana, var. purpurea has new purple leaves.

Acacia cultriformis, the Knife Edge Acacia, has phyllodes like small triangular knife blades.

Acacia stenophylla, the Shoe String Acacia, an open tree with 8-10 inch long narrow leaves.

Occasionally specialty nurseries will have other interesting Acacias. Two sources are San Marcus Growers and Australian Native Plants Nursery in Ventura.

This time of year features lots of ferocacti and dudleyas in flower, along with the spectacular landscapes of this wonderful peninsula and the usual array of Boojums, Elephant Trees, agaves, etc.


New Library books

"Cacti of Texas In Their Natural Habitat" by Gertrud and Ad Konings

A few years ago I remember listening to a couple of club members discussing a field trip to Texas to look at cacti. I have seen programs on Mexican and South American cactus trips, but honestly, I didn't know if Texas had many interesting cacti or not. Surprisingly, a good number of Texas cacti are not particularly common in culture even though they may be stunning. Usually that means they aren't easy to keep.

There is only a small amount of information about each species, but some very good general cacti info at the beginning of the book and location maps at the end. The pictures are quite nice, taking up the entire page, leaving no boundary. Smaller detail photos are then included over the top of the larger picture. Each species has at least a whole page with many getting the center fold treatment.



I always try to judge things

by what they try to be and not what I wish they were. The book, *Cacti of Texas* is somewhat of a hybrid format in my opinion. It's really in a coffee table layout, being almost 12 inches square, easier to read laying flat on a table. I think it does that very well. My first reaction when I saw the book was, "This is a beautiful book." There are some excellent photos showing both the plants and the habitat. It covers the cacti of Texas pretty well, I think, as there are over 200 species included. It makes me want to look for some sleeper cacti for my collection, if not travel throughout Texas to see them. If you like cacti, but don't know *Ancistrocactus* from *Escobaria*, this is the book for you.

15 freeway, exit El Norte Pkwy which is 1 mile north of highway 78

Right turn from northbound - head east

Left turn from southbound - head east

Seven Oaks Rd - immediate RIGHT turn (frontage road)

Borden Rd - 1/4 mile - LEFT turn

Avocado Ave - 1/2 mile - LEFT turn


