energy efficient use of tree canopy, permeable ground cover, shady and sunny areas in landscape; firewise landscape, as needed

Appropriate maintenance:

mulch; weeds kept to a minimum; plants neat, tidy and attractive

Efficient methods of irrigation:

designed to reduce runoff; appropriate irrigation equipment for plant material; water consumption appropriate to area

STRATEGIC PLANNING SESSION

On January 3rd we held a Strategic Planning Session (SPS). The following Board members were present:: Peter Walkowiak, Jerry and Candy Garner, Ken Blackford, Cathy Clark, Susan Hopkins, Jean O'Daniel, Frank Lozoya and Don Hunt. Also present were Steve Harris as Newsletter Editor and Bill O'Daniel as facilitator. The underlying theme for the day was "How can we make this a better organization for our members?" "How can we make meeting more fun, informative and meet our member's needs?" We used the 2007 Member Survey as part of the input.

During the course of the day we developed the foundation for running the SDCSS for the next year and beyond. The first thing we did was review the purpose statement from the SDCSS Bylaws. It proved to be perfect for use as a mission statement.

MISSION: To promote knowledge, study and interest in cacti and succulent plants through education programs, exhibits public, public gardens, and sharing of this common interest

After discussing and accepting the SDCSS Mission Statement, we held discussion on what we wanted the Vision for the organization to be. The primary question being what do we as a group want to look like in 2011? The discussion was distilled down to the following statement:

VISION: To become the most respected and recognized Cactus and Succulent Society

Once we reached consensus on the Vision we were ready to move on to a goal that would focus our activities towards achieving the Vision. The BHAG (Big Hairy Audacious Goal) should be achievable, yet drive us to do what needs to be done. So we discussed, defined, refined and finally agreed to a statement. We liked the word Rally, because of its indication of activity.

BHAG: Rally public interest & SDCSS participation to support the CSSA Convention in 2011

With the BHAG in place we brainstormed Strategies to accomplish the BHAG. In any one year an organization can only take on so many things so we decided on 4 specific areas to focus our energy.

STRATEGY 1: Develop a culture of Volunteerism (Owner: Susan Hopkins)

STRATEGY 2: Build and maintain an active membership (Owner: Frank Lozoya)

STRATEGY 3: Improve promotion of SDCSS (Owner: Ken Blackman)

STRATEGY 4: Improve all sales venues (Owner: Chris Miller)

Once the Strategies were locked in we broke into four groups and brainstormed the actions we need to take this year to work toward achieving the BHAG. We reviewed the inputs as group and decided on Strategy Owners. Each Strategy needs an owner to head the efforts of the individuals carrying out the actions to achieve the Strategies. Each one of their owners is looking for team members to support the actions that need to be done.

HUNTINGTON BOTANICAL GARDENS FREE DESERT FORUM

On Saturday 17 January several carloads of SDCSS members made the journey to The Huntington and received free admission to the Desert Forum. The day included a wonderful tour through the Desert Garden, including the Conservatory, with members of the Staff strategically placed to help answer questions. We had a lovely stroll through the garden, with everyone in my group making sure I didn't miss a single Gasteria.



Hey what are friends for? The Aloes were magnificent and the size of the plants in the garden is amazing.



We stopped to eat lunch in the Teaching Green House. We brought our lunches and the Huntington Staff provided some snacks and drinks. It was great eating in the greenhouse among all kinds of interesting hanging plants and great company.

After lunch we toured some of the displays and collections. I personally took a walk through the new Chinese Garden and it is impressive and very different from the Japanese Garden. At one o'clock the plant sales open up and there was a mad but civilized dash for sales plants. I did manage to find a Gasteria hybrid I don't have called "Bronze Knuckles". I can't wait for it to grow up so I can see it's true shape and color!

At two o'clock we had a meeting in the Ahanson Classroom led by Director of the Gardens, Jim Folsom. He discussed the current and future activities that are impacting the Desert Garden. They are currently installing a gas heating system throughout the Desert Garden. San Marino gets a bit cooler than we do in the winter and there is a fear of loosing the whole



garden, as the temps get cooler. They were installing gas lines the day were there and there were also some heaters in place already. They are installing the kind of heater that you see in patios. The idea is to have a box to slide the heater towers into for the winter and remove them in the summer. Overall cost of the entire project is going to be around \$300,000.

They are currently planning on building a new conservatory for Desert Plants, making a more interactive teaching experience, similar to their Conservatory for Botanical Science. They are looking for suggestions on how to design it so if you have ideas we can get you contact information.

All in all it was a glorious southern California day of 80 degrees with a light breeze and a wonderful garden to visit – it doesn't get any better than this, and I highly recommend that more of you join us next year!



WEB SITE REVIEW

Succulent Euphorbias

Here is a website I have bookmarked and used frequently. The website is in German and English. Of course having a German author gives it special authority. It seems to me the most advanced European growers are very advanced indeed. It has 2360 photos of 502 different species, subspecies, varieties and forms of the genera Euphorbia, Cnidoscolus, Monadenium, Jatropha, Pedilanthus, Phyllanthus and Synadenium according to its headers. The website is divided into a section on the plants with data to habitat, growth form, cyathia, cultivation, rarity, pests and diseases. Also a section on cultivation with 147 more photos. Soil, water, feeding, light, heat and raising from seed are covered in detail with attention to species specific information. Information on cuttings, rescue of rotting plants is included in another section.

I have used it the most to help identify some of the dwarf euphorbias that are very similar and need careful examination of the cyathia . The photos are very well done by my rank novice standards. Many of the cyanthia subjects are so small, it's difficult to appreciate. I frequently use this website, in addition to the Euphorbia Journals when I am looking at euphorbias in catalogs or on Ebay. Frequently, the picture a seller may have of a seedling doesn't give me a good idea of the plant if I'm not familiar with it at all. Lots of great plants are so rare/unusual that I need a quick comprehensive collection of pictures and information. This website really helps.
