Cactus of the Month

"The Genus Gymnocalycium" Steve Harris



Edward F. Anderson, in *The Cactus Family* (Timber Press, 2001) places the genus *Gymnocalycium* in the Cactaceae Family, sub-Family Cactoideae, Tribe Trichocereeae.

Gymnocalycium species range from Central Argentina north through Paraguay and Uruguay to Bolivia and Brazil.

The name *Gymnocalycium* derives from the Greek *gymnos*, naked, and *calyx*, bud, referring to the smooth flower bud. Five sub-genera are recognized by **Graham Charles** in *Gymnocalycium in Habitat and Culture* (self-published, 2009) based on similarities in the seed structure and the ways the seed pods burst to disperse seed. These sub-genera are Macrosemineum, Gymnocalycium (originally Ovatisemineum), Microseminum, Trichomoseminum and Muscosemineum.

The first description of a plant which would be ultimately classified as *Gymnocalycium* was by **Haworth** in 1812 of a plant he called *Cactus gibbosus*. This species was combined with *Cactus reductus* and *Echinocactus denudatus* into the *Gymnocalycium* genus in 1844. By the time **Britton and Rose** published *The Cactaceae* in 1922, there were 23 recognized species of *Gymnocalycium*.

The period between World Wars I and II saw a great interest in cacti in Europe, in particular in Germany. A botanist working in Cordoba, Argentina, Dr. Carlos Hosseus, sent many examples to Adolf Haage, a nurseryman in Erfurt, Germany. The business of cacti became lucrative enough that Haage commissioned a trip


by **Curt Backeberg** in 1930 and 1931 which took him through Peru, Bolivia and northern Argentina. **Backeberg**, unfortunately, was more enthusiastic than botanically accurate. He described several species from plants he discovered in German nurseries which lacked sufficient habitat data. Many descriptions lacked photographs or type plants for Herbarium preservation. A story persists concerning **Backeberg** describing a new species from a moving train car in the Andes.

The result was pandemonium, not only among the *Gymnocalycium* but virtually all genera of South American cacti. When **Backeberg** published *Das Kakteenlexikon* in 1966, he included 83 species of *Gymnocalycium*. Botanists have been patiently sifting through the available reference data to put to rest many of the old, confused names.

After World War II, many botanists were active in the subject of South American cacti, the most accomplished being **Friedrich Ritter**. Strict laws concerning habitat-collected specimens brought many enthusiasts to the local areas to collect seed, which resulted in several other discoveries of *Gymnocalycium* species. At present, **Graham Charles** accepts 56 species.

Many are in the trade, under one name or another. **Miles Anderson's** 2009 catalog includes over 40 species of *Gymnocalycium*, and is a recommended source for plants for your collection.

Gymnocalycium species can generally be broken into two general categories, those that clump and those that usually remain solitary. Cluster-

ing species include *G. andreae* and the slightly larger *G. bruchii*, both from the area near Cordoba, Argentina.

Solitary species include *G. baldianum*, which has flowers of variable color including red; *G. cardenasianum*, a pink flowered variety from Bolivia; *G. denudatum* with bright white flowers from Brazil and Uruguay; *G. erinaceum* with black tipped spines like a hedgehog from Argentina; *G. eurypleurum* from Cerro Leon, Paraguay, which may be

endangered by land clearance in habitat; *G. hossei* from La Rioja, Argentina, sometimes mistakenly called *manzanense*; and *G. oenanthemum* with flowers that start orange and darken to red from Catamarca, Argentina, sometimes mistakenly called *tillianum* or *carminanthum*.

Other solitary species include *G. pflanzii ssp zegarrae* from Campero, Bolivia, the most northerly of *Gymnocalycium* species, sometimes mistakenly called var. albipulpa or albopulpa or *G. zegarrae*; *G. quehlianum*, notable for its white flower with a red throat from Cordoba, Argentina; *G. saglionis*, the giant of the genus at 12 inches and profuse white to pink flowers, widely spread from Jujuy in the north to

further south in Argentina; *G. schroederianum ssp. bayense* from Buenos Aires, Argentina, sometimes mis-labeled *bayensis*, fairly new to the trade and named for the Sierra Bayas; and *G. stenopleurum* from the Gran Chaco of Paraguay, sometimes mistakenly called *friedrichii*, this is the "Star Cactus" with the chlorophyll bred out and grafted onto *Hylocereus* stock.

If you where to ask me at a meeting, "Don, what's the best cactus book we have?" My brain would immediately go into a spiral something like this.



Do they mean all cacti total everywhere?

No, I don't think that is the ideal format for a book, it would be hard to go into much detail with such a broad generalized topic, better to specialize a little bit.

What group of cactus would I want the book to be on?

Well, a genera is a pretty nice neat grouping if it was large enough to be interesting, but small enough to cover each species with a few pages at least. My genera should be pretty common in culture, a major group. There should be plenty of small pot size species, so that any cactus collector would have a few, but not so large that divisions are interesting only to the taxonomically inclined. If it was from someplace exotic, the locality info would be more interesting. Speaking of locality info, I love range maps. My best of book has to have them as well as distribution details with local conditions for soil, rainfall etc maybe with locality photos that show the terrain and vegetation. Some cactus are more threatened by development than others, so including this in the format is interesting.

What about the format of the book?

Certainly, lots of pictures. You know what though? I'm still amazed by the difference between habitat grown cactus and cactus in culture. It would be really great if each species


had both kinds of pictures

Anything else?

Yeah, we are cactus growers. We must have cultivation info, even if it is British based. Apparently, they are the only ones who still command the written English language.

So, my nomination is **Gymnocalycium** in **Habitat and Culture** by **Graham Charles**.

I bought a copy of this book for myself, and our library has a copy, which can be borrowed. Be sure and take a look.

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
