Candy was kind enough to develop a Job Description for the task. Contact Chris Miller if you are interested.

#### **Brag Table Job Description**

- Create and print signs for three tables for Novice, Intermediate, and Advanced for cactus and succulent entries; (as required)
- Create and print signs of requirements for entries, e.g. must have owned/grown the plant for a minimum of six months or more; (as required)
- Create and print signs for "Please Do Not Touch the Plants"; (as required)
- Create, print, and cut entry forms in green (novice), yellow (intermediate) and blue (advanced); (monthly)
- ◆ Create, print, and cut coupons for winners in same colors for 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 3<sup>rd</sup> place for each level's winners;

The Amazing & Diverse Baja California Flora (with a Succulent Emphasis)

The Baja California Peninsula is a narrow strip of land stretching for approximately 1300 km in length and ranging from 45 km to 240 km in width. Its geographic position, latitudinal span, and topographic heterogeneity have conferred a diverse assemblage of weather regimes including a Mediterranean-type, winter rainfall climate; extreme arid, hot desert conditions; and tropical, summer rainfall patterns. In addition, the region's biogeographic history and physiognomy have resulted in a wide range of vegetation types which include coastal sage scrub, chaparral, oak woodland, conifer forest, many desert ecoregions, and tropical deciduous forest. The peninsula is also characterized by the presence of several islands along its coast, which are located in the Gulf of California (Sea of Cortés) and the Pacific Ocean. This piece of land and its adjacent islands support a wealth



of species diversity in many different plant families. It is estimated that the flora consists of more than 4,500 plant taxa with approximately 25% of these known only from (endemic to) the Baja California region. Many of the plants from the region are distinctive and stretch the imagination in respect to plant form and structure. With more than 300 succulent plant taxa present and a rather high rate of endemism, the cacti and succulents of Baja California are a conspicuous and truly unique part of the peninsula's natural history.

Come join us on a botanical adventure in this presentation to better understand the amazing & diverse plants that occur in our own "backyard" in Baja California.

Jon P. Rebman, Ph.D. has been the Mary and Dallas Clark Endowed Chair/Curator of Botany at the San Diego Natural History Museum (SDNHM) since 1996. Dr. Rebman is a plant taxonomist and conducts extensive floristic research in Baja California and in San Diego and Imperial Counties. He leads various field classes and botanical expeditions each year and is actively naming new plant species from the region. His primary research interests have centered on the systematics of the Cactus family in Baja California, especially the genera Cylindropuntia (chollas) and Opuntia (prickly-pears). However, Dr. Rebman also does a lot of general floristic research and he co-published the most recent edition of the Checklist of the Vascular Plants of San Diego County. He has over 23 years of field experience with surveying and documenting plants including rare and endangered species. As a field botanist, he is a very active collector of scientific specimens with his personal collections numbering over 27,000. Since 1996, he has been providing plant specimen identification/ verification for various biological consulting companies on contracts dealing with plant inventory projects and environmental assessments throughout southern California. He is the director of the San Diego County Plant Atlas project (www.sdplantatlas.org) and identifies/verifies all of the new specimens (currently over 63,000) coming into the herbarium through this scientific endeavor. As the curator of the SD Herbarium at the SDNHM, he is in charge of this dried plant specimen collection that contains over 235,000 specimens dating back to the 1870s. Rebman recently published a new edition of the Baja California Plant Field Guide with coauthor Norman Roberts in 2012, and is working on a new specimen-based checklist for the plants of Baja California.

The desert regions of Baja California and southern California satisfy my need for scientific adventure while providing a sense of excitement towards botany, reverence for nature and its unaltered beauty, appreciation for the complexity of natural history, and an overall feeling of peace and purpose.

#### Plant of the Month—Aeoniums

Well the heat is FINALLY subsiding and the "cool" weather season for San Diego is coming upon us. Not only is this a great time to smile at your airconditioning bill, it's an even greater time for the genus *Aeonium* as they emerge from their summer dormancy period and enter into fall and winter growth. This isn't to say that there aren't some that cant handle the heat of the kitchen (*Aeonium 'Zwartzkopf'*, *Aeonium leucoblepharum*) but generally they like their misty, cool mornings with days staying at or below the low 80's F range.



Aeoniums as we all know are the succulents that generally form tight and geometric rosettes ranging from



half an inch across (*Aeonium sedifolium*) to nearly two feet wide (*Aeonium davidbramwellii*). The vast majority of this genus' species come from the Canary Islands off Africa, with a few others being from east Africa, Morocco, Madeira Island, and Cape Verdes Islands. Having become very popular in landscaping and horticulture the more hardy varieties such as *Aeonium haworthii* and *Aeonium urbicum* have naturalized in Australia, North America, and Europe. Furthermore, with their ease of hybridization and trait select cultivation, many sports, variegates, and cultivars have been developed and are widely available.

With the exception of one species, the rosettes are monocarpic and die after flowering. But don't fret, several species and varieties branch off

forming shrubs allowing for new growth to over take the gap where a head has flowered and died.


Not only do they serve as a gorgeous and unique addition to any hobbyist's collection, Aeoniums can serve

in practical applications as well. With many species' having their roots being shallow, numerous, and eternally prolific they can serve as a counter to run off from heavy rain. Also, and I speak from experience, certain varieties can ease the irritation caused by *Euphorbia* sap on the skin. Finally, shrubby varieties have been used as fire breaks in agriculture.

As with many of our beloved succulents, these plants are susceptible to the scourge that is bugs. Whether its mealy bugs working their way from the roots up to devour your rosettes crown, ants servicing



those mealy and caking dirt up and around the stem, or aphids out to scar the leaves



If you like color, ease of growth, and flowers that hook the bees up, then *Aeoniums* are a must for your succulent collection. Come check them out!





Their succulent plant collection in their garden is natural looking and yet neat. I say natural looking because the succulents in their garden are very naturally arranged. I say neat because their plant tables are neat and well organized and their award winning plants are well taken care of by Carol. Her *Ariocarpus*, *Copiapoas*, *Ferocactus glaucescens nuda*, *Aztekium ritteri*, *Tylecodon reticulatus* and *Ceraria namaquensis* are so well grown and perfect, no wonder they win awards and trophies! Carol nurtures the plants and Paul photographs and catalogs them. Their plants have added a great deal to our shows and their organizational skills have made doing the club's business more simple which allows more time for all the fun stuff!



Some background will shed some light on what led up to our club being so lucky to have their priceless contributions. Carol started to love succulents while raising their family in Ann Arbor Michigan. They have a son and a daughter who each have a son and a daughter. They are very proud of all of their accomplishments. Carol earned 2 bachelor's degrees, one in Political Science and one in Occupational Therapy and a master's degree in Rehab Counseling. Carol went on to become an Occupational Therapist, treating people with physical conditions so they could maintain their skills in the workplace. Paul earned a PhD in Physics and became an Experimental Research Physicist. He first worked at the Ford Motor Company Scientific Research Lab in Dearborn Michigan and later at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena.

Carol and Paul moved to California in 1987 and in 1999 became members of the San Gabriel CSS. They edited the SGVCSS newsletter for several years. In 2004 they moved to San Marcos and joined the SDCSS and Palomar CSS. They edited the EyF, (our newsletter) from 5/2009 to 12/2012. During that time, Paul introduced the club to the electronic age, creating an electronic version of the EyF. This widened its distribution while reducing costs. He took over the membership chair in 2012, transitioned its database to Excel, wrote a user-form to manage it, created ID numbers for the membership, and prepared and distributed permanent laminated ID badges. Paul rebuilt the club website in 2013 and digitized all back-issues of the EyF, making them available on line. Combined with Sharon Wirth's cataloging of articles, this provides a wonderful, searchable history of our club. A DVD of this EyF library was produced, and is available for purchase. Together with the librarians, Paul bar-code labeled the Club library books and wrote an Excel program for managing them. Most recently, he programmed the new cash registers making it much easier and faster for members and visitors to purchase plants at our show and sales. And the volunteers appreci-

ate it too. Paul and Carol's wonderful plants have won many trophies and ribbons through the years. In the 2014 summer show and sale, they won trophies for "Best Cactus," "Best Graft," "Best Mexican Plant," "High Points < 25 entries," "People's Choice" and finally, what Carol is most proud of, a "Judges Choice" ribbon for their *Tylecodon reticulatus*. So, you see whatever The Makers do, they do it and make it right.














# Coffee in the Garden at the Miller's November 22<sup>nd</sup> 2014 10am to 1pm

Ruth Jane Wright passed away on Thursday, October 23<sup>rd,</sup> 2014 surrounded by her family at home. She was born Ruth Jane Naylor in Corpus Christi, Texas on April 2, 1931. She came to Long Beach, California with her family in 1942 and graduated Poly High school class of 1948. She married Clarence (Dick) Burdick Wright on November 11, 1949. They made their first home in Los Alamitos, CA. She started a career as a political activist assisting her husband as City Parks Commissioner. Ruth wrote a history of early Orange County and presented it to the Los Alamitos Historical Society. She enjoyed working as a seamstress, making custom dresses, and alterations. In 1976 they moved to Fallbrook to start an exotic plant nursery. Her hobbies included attending creative writing workshops, floral arranging, and painting. In 1985 their home and nursery were destroyed by a fire. They joined the DeLuz Canyon Volunteer Fire Department in 2000 where she served as communications dispatcher. Ruth continued as an activist helping create two permanent fulltime fire protection departments serving her community. She is survived by her husband of sixty five years Clarence (Dick) Burdick Wright, her children; Kraig Duane Wright, Ruth Arlie (Candy) Jernegan, and Lucy Danielle Parks. Four grandchildren and three greatgrandchildren. The memorial service was held on Saturday, November 1, 2014 in Fallbrook.

Ruth Jane Wright passed away on Thursday, October 23<sup>rd,</sup> 2014 surrounded by her family at home. She was born Ruth Jane Naylor in Corpus Christi, Texas on April 2, 1931. Four grandchildren and three great- grandchildren. The memorial service was held on Saturday, November 1, 2014 in Fallbrook.
