Pl ant of the month Tom Knapik The "False Stones"



I he Asclepiad subfamily has given rise to some of the most interesting succulent plants in the world. The plants exhibit true convergent evolution to an ideal shape for extremely arid conditions and the flowers have been given the title "Orchids of the Succulent World" by Stapeliad grower extraordinaire, **Gerald Barad**. It is no wonder that we often have a few of these botanical wonders in our collections.

The genus that I find the most interesting in this diverse subfamily is *Pseudolithos*. Translated, it means "false stone" and is comprised of only a handful of species with very succulent stems. The type specimen was described by **Bally** (1965) from Somalia. Subsequent expeditions have turned up several new species all of which are from eastern Africa. Below is a list of the currently recognized species in the genus with some additional comments.

Pseudolithos migiurtinus (Chiov.) Bally

The most common species of the genus in cultivation, it is relatively easy to grow on it's own roots as long as you water carefully. During the warm summer months they can handle frequent watering but during cold weather should be kept dry. *P. sphaericus* is believed to be a synonymy.

Pseudolithos cubiformis Bally

P.cubiformis is from Somalia and has the largest flowers in the genus. I saw my first specimen in the collection of Slava VIk of the Czech Republic in 1998. It has been successfully grown from

seed and is now more widely available. I believe it is easier to cultivate than *P. migiurtinus*.

Pseudolithos eylensis

A recently discovered species from Eyl, Somalia. The town name also appears as Eil so the plant also circulates as *P. eilensis*. Many consider this to be no more than a variety of *Pseudolithos migiurtinus*. *P. eylensis* has a slightly different flower structure. **Miles Anderson** showed me images of both species next to one another and it was difficult to see the difference. The growth of *P. eylensis* can be described as less symmetric than *P. migiurtinus* by comparison.

Pseudolithos caput-viperae

This species, from Somalia, has a different flower morphology than the

other members of the genus. It is the smallest species with individual segments that are quarter size. It has jointed offsets which can be removed and rooted. However, it is difficult to grow and is usually grafted on Ceropegia. It is still very rare in collections. Pseudolithos harardheranus M. Dioli

This recently described Somalian species (2002) has very small flowers. Until recently no seedlings were available. C & J Cactus Nursery has produced several seedlings as seen in the image at the right. It is still very rare in collections.

Pseudolithos horwoodi Bally & Lavarnos

A wonderful article was published in the CSSA Journal (Sep-Oct 1974) regarding **Frank Horwood's** discovery. Two plants were found but only one survived the trip to England. It



flowered and was deemed a new species. See image at right. Since that time, no other specimens have come to light. The only known specimen may have been aberrant and until more are found, the species has an undetermined status.

Pseudolithos gigas Dioli

Undetermined status. Published in the CSSA Journal vol.75, March-April 2003 No.2 by Mauri**zio Dioli**, some believe this plant to be a larger specimen of P. cubiformis.

Pseudolithos dodsoniana and P. mccovi

Both of these species have been moved into a new genus, Anomalluma Plowes 1993. They were placed in Pseudolithos by Dr. Meve & Dr. Bruvns but after DNA analysis Meve transfered them back to Anomalluma.


Cultivation

In an article I found on the web, "How NOT to kill Pseudolithos cubiformis" there is a discussion of the various techniques of keeping these plants alive. There are several key factors. Temperature should be between 60° - 80° (in winter, my plants survived 40° but they were bone dry, with regular water during the summer months). The growth medium should have little to no organic material. I use pure pumice along with a dilute liquid fertilizer during the summer months. One additional factor is fresh airflow. I believe this is essential for healthy growth.

Propagation

If you are successful growing this genus, you will be rewarded with some very interesting, albeit small, flowers. Due to their size the odor of decaying flesh, common in Stapeliads, is mild. I have tried pollinating them with a dissecting scope but was unsuccessful. Placing them outside and letting nature handle things is the easiest way. I set some horns on P. migiurtinus using this method and germinated the seed when the pods had matured. Growing them from seed is the best form of propagation. Fresh seed is a must as they lose their viability within a few months. Grafting is done to avoid root rot or save a plant.

At the meeting on May 12, I'll be describing these species, but if you have an interesting Stapeliad, please bring it, especially if it is in bloom. These flowers are as Barad's web page states, "Orchids of the Succulent World".

Show Rules

All prop-Read the Entry Notes below the Plant Entry Classification Schedule. The show is open to anyone who grows succulent plants. no limit to the number of entries per class or the number of classes entered, though no entry can be entered in more than one class. erty shall be marked with the owner's name, not visible to the judges. The exhibitor must have grown the plant for at least six months.

All entries must have properly filled entry cards and must be entered in the appropriate Division and Class to be eligible for awards. Exhibitors are responsible for placing these items with their entries. For the best plant grown from seed, the exhibitors must have raised the plant themselves. Plants may be species or hybrids. Hybrids may be exhibited in the class of either parent. Grafted plants will be accepted in any class, though awards for grafts will be selected from Division IV.

Entries must be clear, healthy (pest-free) and dry. Remove Plant Name Tags in pots (except for collections and displays). Awards must remain with exhibits until the close of the show. Classes with few entries may be combined; classes with too many entries may have a Class C added. The show committee reserves the right to reject plants or exhibits and to readjust entries for the good of the show. Show hours must be followed. The San Diego Cactus and Succulent Society will exercise due caution in safeguarding exhibits. However, SDCSS cannot assume responsibility for loss of property. Entries are judged against perfection. The judges' decisions are final. In the case of disputes, the show chair(s) shall make final decisions.

TROPHIES AND PLAQUES are perpetual, except the educational and novice awards. First, second and third place ribbons will be awarded in each class; however, should the judges feel that a first, second, or third place is not merited, no awards will be given. To receive the CSSA Award, two or more educational displays must be entered. The judges will award Rosettes to their favorite plants.

Note that one plant per container is allowed in these classes.

Three categories for competing entries are as follows: **GREEN** cards for exhibitors that have won 10 or less blue ribbons in a recognized cactus and succulent show. **YELLOW** cards are for participants that have won more than 10 blue ribbons. **BLUE** cards are for commercial exhibitors and those that want to compete against them. Awards will be selected from any category.

Guillermo Rivera

"Succulents of Western South Africa: from Cape Town to the Richtersveld"



Guillermo was born in Argentina. He earned BS and PhD (Botany) degrees from the University of Cordoba, Argentina, and an MS in Marine Biology from Northeastern University, Boston. He worked as a researcher for 6 years at the University of Cordoba, with more than 20 articles in scientific magazines (including a co-authorship in Nature). He also worked as a researcher for the National Park Service in the U.S. Virgin Islands.

He is the owner of South America Nature Tours (formerly Cactus Expeditions), a company dedicated to the organization of tours throughout South America (Chile, Argentina, Brazil, Peru, Bolivia, and Ecuador) with emphasis on plants (bromeliads, cacti, and orchids), or birding.

His presentation describes a recent trip he lead into South Africa.


