The measure he used was one tablespoon to a gallon of water. **Juergen Menzel** shared with me yesterday that he has been treating his water with vinegar for years with good results.

Pam Badger gave a great talk on *Sansevarias*. Any plant that can smell like chocolate must be all right! **Kelly Griffin** and **Todd Masilko** judged the Brag Table Plants and held an interesting discussion about the plants. The brag table competition is now in three categories, nov-

CSSA CONVENTION FIELD TRIPS AND TOURS

Convention Countdown has begun! On your calendars draw double circles around WED, APRIL 27th 2011 because that's FIELD TRIP/TOURS day!!! Busses will be searching for succulents everywhere - traveling to the Anza Borrego Desert; Quail Gardens & The Wild Animal Park; various Dudleyas & Barrel Cactus habitats; and many local public & private Gardens.

At least 11 separate day trips have been planned, and authorized by CSSA, most including multiple locations. But YOU can only choose one trip [unlike plants we can't clone ourselves...] and while choosing please consider becoming a **LEADER**, **CAPTAIN** or **HOST** for the trip of your choice?!

SDCSS members are needed to make each adventure an interesting, informative, safe and fun experience for all our guests. The money is budgeted [the seeds are planted] but planning [growth] needs our joint efforts - lets bring these trips to fruition! YOUR input and expertise is needed.

Each organizational **Leader** will decide what is the "story" of each trip and how best it can be told. **Leaders** will also be **Captains** of their first bus making sure people & supplies are safely loaded at each stop. Additional busses will need **Assistant Captains**.

Local **Hosts** will orally introduce the specific location & plants. Some gardens & nurseries may have their own resident hosts [ex:The Huntington] who will give a tour. Other localities [ex: Off-road@ Anza Borrego; member's gardens] will need host(s) to expand knowledge. Obviously there may be overlap between **Host**, **Captain** and **Leader** duties with everyone invited to share their enthusiasm! See below for clarification of the duties of these very important people.

Trips & Tours, 2011 CSSA Convention The Trip Leader & His Team

Trip Leader:

There will be one Trip **Leader** for each of the 11 Trips we offer. The Trip **Leader** is responsible for doing what it takes to make their trip an

interesting, informative, fun and safe experience for all our guests. The **Leader** is responsible for bringing in the cost of his/her trip at or under the approved budget.

Bus Captain and Assistant Captain:

Each bus will need a **Captain**. The **Leader** will be the **Captain** of the first bus. Any second or additional bus will need its own **Captain**. Each of the largest buses (47 passenger) will need an **Assistant Captain**. The **Captain** will be responsible to be sure all of the necessary people and supplies and purchases are safely loaded on the bus at each stop, and that the trip is safe and pleasant. The **Captain** will keep the guests regularly informed of the status and progress of the trip and the time to be spent at each stop. He/she may make detailed announcements explaining the upcoming locations. The **Captain** is primarily responsible for keeping the trip running on, or as close to, schedule as possible.

Local Host:

The Local **Host** is the person that introduces the location to the guests. He/she is probably a specialist of some kind, and certainly is passionate about that particular location. Depending on the location(s) you visit on your trip, you may or may not have a local host. For example a public garden such as The Huntington, will have a Local Host who serves as a single point of contact who will get us through the admissions process and who will (himself/herself or through others) make an oral presentation to introduce our guests to the garden/location. Probably most of the Anza Borrego desert stops will not have a Local Host. On that and similar trips, the **Leader** and any **Captains** will share the duties of the Local **Host**.

Debra Lee Baldwin's book, 'Succulent Container Gardens' Includes the following paragraph, which fits in with **Don Hunt's** demonstration given at the August meeting:

"Cacti and succulents prefer slightly acidic soil; the ideal pH is between 5.6 and 6.0. (A pH of 7.0 is neutral; below 7 is acidic, above 7 is alkaline.) Irrigating with tap water may tip the balance toward alkalinity, and roots will not be able to efficiently access nutrients. To test this, add 1 tablespoon (no more, or roots may burn) white vinegar per every 5 gallons of tap water. Observe the results after your plants have received this for a month or two. You may notice a remarkable increase in vitality as roots take up unlocked nutrients. Plants will have used the residue after the first few applications of acidulated water, so at that point begin fertilizing."

The Way We Were Circa 1968

Continuing the recall of the members from the early days, **Nellie Kennett** springs first to mind. What motivated her to suddenly turn an elegant cartwheel on the podium during the meeting which was the first I ever attended? She did it so lightly, so naturally, so easily for a woman over 50! Whatever her motivation, it was a magic moment. Nellie was known as the 'Hug Lady of National City' - the Major even made a proclamation. Big hearted and generous, she was not a lady to be ignored, as **Joan Fleer** wrote in Memoriam in 1999.

A hard act to follow but **Julianne Rice** qualifies. Despite having traveled widely she lived in Holtville. **Julianne** had a jeep and joined a boisterous band of off-road sand dune climbers, from whence came her nickname of '**Grannie Annie**.' An accomplished hostess, she invited us all for breakfast on one of the caravans led by **Scotty**, served on a huge silver platter. Later she invited my Mother and me for a weekend in Holtville in July. **Julianne** took us for a jolting jeep experience at first light in the desert. We were treated to rattlesnakes swimming in one of the canals of the Colorado River, and tiny burrowing owls standing like sentinels along the side of the road. For some reason, there was a rocking chair instead of a seat in the back of her jeep; I hung on with clenched hands, my Mother rolling her eyes over her shoulder as we bounced along over hill and dale. One of the best rides I've ever had.

Another notable was Dr. **Phil Corliss**. My son **Ben** swears that he had a rose named after him. Google did not list it, but recognized him as a breeder of Iris and Daylilies, and a lecturer of note. However, he was a bit reluctant to share cuttings of his succulents, so much so that it was furtive fun to pinch a few, very judiciously of course.

Bill Nelson and his wife Ruth were active supporters. He has been President during the 60's. Ruth innovatively gave gift plants the species name of the donor—brilliant, for she always knew where to get another, if one didn't make it. They had a long fence which served as support for their luxurious night blooming cereus. When the huge buds swelled to bursting, they began a chain of telephone calls to "come see" the huge flowers open before your very eyes! An exciting time, never to be forgotten, as one pure white petal after another popped open.

Dr. **Leroy Phelps**, Microbiologist, a dapper, diminutive Lincolnesque figure, was a specialist in all things succulent; his *Agave filifera* was magnificent. A few years ago we encountered him working/volunteering at Grigsby's in Vista, which **Madelyn Lee**, a specialist in *Euphorbias*, bought from the original family.

Virginia Ennis was President of the Floral Association when I met her as representative of our Society in 1970. Another representative was Elizabeth _______, who recently resigned. We are one of the many horticultural societies affiliated with the Floral Association, established before the Panama Exhibition, and the first garden club in San Diego. Their elegant meetings were held in the Grant Hotel, accompanied by a musical program. They also published California Garden, the oldest garden magazine in continual publication in California. Virginia was a bright attractive brunette with expressive brown eyes, and very witty with a wry sense of humor that gave her comments a unique twist on the passing scene. She was an accredited Flower Show Judge and partnered a painting with an arrangement in the annual Art in the Park Program of the San Diego Art Museum until her untimely death two years ago.

During my tenure as Program Chairman, I asked **Virginia** to do a program on succulent arrangements which gave her such pleasure she joined our Society. On rejoining C&S some time in the early 90's, it was a delight to renew our friendship. People who only knew her at this time missed the spirit and fun of knowing the true **Virginia**; God bless and rest her.

Much to my shame, I "burned out" when I realized there was another year to go as Program Chairman. A full time job as SOQ Secretary at Balboa Naval Hospital, sandwiched between two busses each way, two children to raise, and other activities with little time for my garden led to my abrupt departure. Probably no one remembers but me. That was 1975. After about a 20 year hiatus I rejoined. There were few people I recognized, and fewer still who recognized me. One man asked, "Didn't you used to wear big hats?" Told him, "Still do." Another queried "Didn't you used to wear a lot of beads?" Same answer. A third asked, "Didn't you used to be a lot thinner?" "Yes---and I used to be a lot younger!"

After my companion **Edward** of 21 years died I was left without transportation. **Jeff Wright** brought flowers from **Joyce** and **Michael** and introduced me to **Ethel** and **Bob Schillinger** who joined C&S after bringing me to two meetings. We three attend regularly. I wish I could contribute more currently than my presence in the right front row seat, but am happy looking back at active participation in many areas.

What do Chopin, Gustavo Romero and Majorca have in common?

Chopin was born in Poland and early in his life he moved to Paris to perform, and earned rave reviews. He also met Amantine Aurore Lucille Dupin, Baroness Dudevant, a descendent of Polish kings, and fell in love. Amantine, whose pen name was 'George Sand,' was a dominating woman, and it wasn't long before Chopin and Sand were in Majorca, one of her favorite vacation spots. It was here that Chopin composed much of his music. Their relationship deteriorated in Majorca as did Chopin's health, but their love of local succulents thrived.

For four consecutive Sundays this summer, **Gustavo Romero**, a noted concert pianist and native San Diegan, performed works of **Chopin**, in part, because this year is the 200th anniversary of **Chopin's** birth. After each of the Sunday concerts, there is a post-concert dinner for some of the attendees. At the first dinner, a small plant was placed as a gift at each place setting, a succulent, which recalled **Chopin** and **Sand's** interest in these plants...but missing was the *Aeonium* that occurred on Majorca. At the following week's dinner, **Bev Grant** brought scores of *Aeonium* cuttings from her garden to continue the succulent theme. She spoke briefly about the faltering love affair between **Chopin** and **Sand** and noted that it was ironic that while *Aeoniums* are hardy plants, **Chopin's** health was not, and then speculated that maybe this was the reason for **Chopin's** favoring the *Aeonium*...a hearty succulent. Distributing plants to the enthusiastic was gratifying.

Even more irony. Recently, **Bev** and I passed room 101 where we have our SDCSS meetings and the doors were closed. Previously we had only seen them open and saw neither the number, nor the name on the door. Closed, however, we read Room 101 and then saw the sign, our room is called <u>Majorca</u>!!


