



### echinocereus

**Echinocereus** is a genus of ribbed, usually small to medium-sized cylindrical cacti, comprising about 70 species from the southern United States and Mexico in very sunny rocky places. Usually the flowers are large and the fruit edible. The name comes from the Ancient Greek ἐχῖνος (echinos), meaning "hedgehog," and the Latin cereus meaning "candle." They are sometimes known as hedgehog cacti, a term also used for the *Pediocactus* and *Echinopsis*. *Echinocerus* are bushy and globular with tight spines which are often colorful and decorative. The flowers last slightly longer than other those of other cacti. *Echinocereus* is easier to culture than other cacti. They need a light soil, a sunny exposure, a fresh and dry winter to flower. They like a soil slightly richer than other cacti. In the wild, several of the species are cold-hardy, tolerating temperatures as low as -23°C but only in dry conditions. Sometimes, they shrink in winter but they look fine again with first waterings in the first sunny days.

There is about 100 taxa of *Echinocereus* living from Mexico to the south of the United States. The first part of the genus name *Echinocereus* is coming from the Greek for 'hedgehog', while the second part 'cereus' comes from the Latin for 'large candle'. They branches readily, over time making mounds 3 feet in diameter and 1 feet tall. This gave them the name of Hedgehog Cactus. The different species have a large range of colors from green to yellow, pink, orange, and red. The flowers are goblet shaped and stay open day and night. They are followed by showy red fruits. Some *Echinocereus* are very frost resistant and can go to temperatures below 0°F (-17°C). As is often the case in cactus genera, the bigger species will take full sun while the smaller species like some shade. The *Echinocereus* are propagated by seeds or cuttings. The thicker-stemmed species are generally more successful from seeds.

The Sonoran Desert species of this genus have upright stems, usually not more than a foot (30 cm) tall, and typically in clusters. A few of the 44 currently recognized species in the genus have single stems. The ribbed stems help distinguish hedgehogs from the *Mammillarias*, with which they are sometimes confused. Spines are straight or slightly curved, never hooked as in many *Mammillarias*. The flowers are funnel-shaped or partly funnel-shaped, but abruptly flaring outward about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches (6 cm) across in most Sonoran Desert species. Some are long, narrow funnels

conducive to hummingbird or moth pollination. Flowers come in many colors, including white, yellow, pink, purple, and red; some are bicolored. The stigmas are usually green. Some species of *Echinocereus* are readily distinguished from other cacti by the flower buds that rupture through the skin of the stem, rather than emerging from the areoles. Nearly all species flower in the spring, though a Baja California species flowers in August or September. One species within the Sonoran Desert and a few beyond it have thin, trailing stems. Species occur in nearly all habitats in the arid southwestern United States and southward well into Mexico. The fruits of several species are large, juicy, and tasty. They were eaten by indigenous peoples when they could get them before the birds and squirrels did. The genus is popular among cactus collectors because most species are of moderate size and have beautiful flowers







# WORKSHOP: RAISING YOUR Caudiciform

One of the questions that I often get when one of my caudiciforms are displayed is; How do you do that, expose all those big fat roots? In this workshop I will demonstrate how I go about exposing the roots and staging the plants to best show what nature has provided. Part of the fun of doing this is you do not know what you are going to get, I liken it to opening a present at Christmas or on your birthday. This will be true of the plants that I will use in this workshop which will be, *Pentopentia natalensis*, *Ipomea platense*, *Mestoklema tuberosa*, *Kedrostris africana* and *Trichodiadema tuberosa*.

I will also discuss how to take a small plant and get it big fast. By following some of my strategies you can shave years off the process of getting a show plant that your friends will admire. I will also provide free plants for the first 25 participants, a *Senecio tropaeofolium*, for you to grow into a show plant, I will bring mine in as an example of what to expect.

I want to thank **Don Hunt**, **Jerry Garner** and **Chris Miller** for their donation of pots for this demonstration.

## the plants and habitats of Mexico & Cuba

April's program will feature the plants and habitats of Mexico & Cuba. Mexico is a seemingly infinitely floristically rich land. I was fortunate to see some spectacular habitats on a drive to Oaxaca & back with Kelly Griffin & my wife, Grace. Along the way, some of the characters we met included Agave montana, A. parrasana and A. albopilosa, Astrophytum digitostigma and Echinocactus grusonii (common in the trade, though uncommonly seen in the wild.) Other supporting cast members included echeverias, bromeliads, palms & cycads. Saying "So long" to Kelly, Grace & I then flew to Cuba - where we found a geographically pure country begging to be explored botanically. Cuba is an island located in the northern Caribbean Sea. It is 745 mi long, is the largest is-

land in the Caribbean and is the 16th largest in the world by land area. Searching mainly for the cycad Microcycas calocoma we found an abundance of bromeliads, palms & epiphytic cacti. It is truly a beautiful and astonishing country. This was a wonderful trip and I look forward to sharing my photos with the San Diego Cactus & Succulent Society.

Jeremy Spath began his plant career approximately 6 years ago at Quail Botanic Gardens. There he was exposed to a vast array of plant types making him a Jack of all trades. He discovered there was no end to cool plants and although he loves almost all plant groups, he was mostly attracted to succulents, cycads, palms, bromeliads, & bamboos. Which amusingly one docent once referred to as "Man Plants." After a brief stint at Rancho Soledad Nurserv he now works mainly as a landscape designer, as well as helping out at Xeric Growers a couple days a week. He loves working with plants but is happiest in the field as to him nature is truly the best landscaper.



## Coffee in the garden For April




