TIME TO GET THOSE PLANTS READY FOR THE SHOW! By Allen Clark

Our Winter judged show is now less than a week away, and this is the perfect time to be starting the process of selecting which plants to show. To do this, it's important to think about some of the things judges want to see—or don't—when they're screening the show.

The process should start with grooming your plants. Remove all damaged or dead leaves or other structures. While you're doing this, look for any signs of bugs or other "travelers", dead or alive. If they're alive, spray them and remove

the corpses. A Q-tip with some detergent or rubbing alcohol works in most cases. Also, you want to get out your tweezers and remove any of those volunteer weeds, which seem to be thriving after our very wet winter. Spiders have also been very active, so remove all those webs. A small paintbrush works well for this task.

The next thing to look at is your pots. First, they should be clean. Wipe glazed and unglazed pots to remove any dirt or dried salts. For those terra cotta pots, some people use a WD40 solution. For me, a brisk rub with an old washcloth usually suffices.

One last note on watering: this should be completed several days before setup. Leaky pots can really mess up the display area while the show committee is moving the plants around, so please—do your watering well ahead!

Staging is the next consideration. This comprises the choice of pot or other container, along with top-dressing and a rock or piece of wood. Remember that the plant is supposed to be the star of each individual entry. Therefore, the other elements should never upstage the plant. Containers should be the right size and shape. Many growers feel that containers which in some way mimic or reflect the natural habitat of a plant look best. If you're using glazed pots, remember to use color carefully. For example, if you have a *Euphorbia* which has some reddish coloration in the stem or leaves, it's great to use a burgundy pot to add a little "punch". Likewise, top-dressing is best accomplished with a color of material which does not draw attention to itself. This is NOT the time to use that bright turquoise aquarium gravel which has been sitting dry in the old tank at the back of the garage for a couple of decades. Use a neutral color for most plants. If your container is black, though, you can also use black gravel as top-dressing.

Okay, now all your plants are ready. There are a few more things to do, though. First, remove all the tags from your plants, being sure to make a complete list of what you're entering. If you didn't pick up your entry tickets at the January meeting you can pick them up at the event when you bring your plants. Fill them out ahead of time, if you can, according to the entry schedule which was mailed out with last months issue of the newsletter. That saves you time during setup on Friday evening or Saturday morning.

Remember that it's not unusual for plants to shift during transit from your home to the show. It's a good idea to carry a small container of topdressing to fix any spillage. It can't hurt to bring a few paper towels, Q-tips and your favorite cleaning compound for any last-minute touching up.

Upcoming CSSA Journal

Volume 85 begins with an account of exploration in Mexico by Julia Etter and Martin Kristen. So far, two new species (an *Echeveria* and a *Sedum*) have been described as a result of their work, named in honor of the authors in the recently-published *Haseltonia 18*. Here they tell us more about the extremely challenging terrain around the Rio Piaxtla as well as other plants seen in the area, several of which still await better understanding. Socotra is once again difficult to travel to, after a short

period when tourists could visit relatively freely. Despite the current difficulties, the intrepid Alain Rzepecky managed to find a new arborescent *Euphorbia* species, described here and ac-

companied by spectacular habitat images. The second new species described in this issue is a member of the genus *Eriospermum* from near the Orange River area in Southern Africa. Graham Williamson provides some beautiful drawings to illustrate the finer points of this plant. *Euphorbia schoenlandii* and a Kelly Griffin hybrid *Aloe* 'Red Ridge' feature in Duke Benadom's Superb Succulents article. Jeff Chemnick provides an in-depth guide to the cycad genus *Dioon* as it occurs in Oaxaca, in an article held over from the Special Edition on the CSSA tour to that state, which came out in 2012. Finally, Elton Roberts' article on the genus *Micropuntia* is sure to be the first encounter for many with this fascinating group

of plants, and again he provides an alternative and informed view of current taxonomy.

I've been working on my yard since purchasing my house in 2004. I had grown tropicals and *Bromeliads* while living in Los Angeles prior to moving to San Diego and you can see remnants of those collections along with some unusual shrubs such as *Crotalaria agatiflora* (canary bird bush) for which a pair of Orioles return to each year when nesting and *Podachaenium eminens* (daisey tree) which blooms with immense heads of white flowers. I have yet to get my *Heliconia* to bloom, unfortunately.

I became enamored with succulents about ten years ago due to their striking architecture as well as the intricate flowers that some have. Like many of you, I haven't met a succulent I don't like, and you can see that I have been introduced to different kinds at various times as observed by my growing collections of various ones which started with *Aloe* and *Agave* and quickly moved to *Echeveria*, *Aeonium, Crassula, Kalanchoe* and more recently *Gasterias* and *Haworthias*. I also have a number of terrestrial *Bromeliads* including *Dyckia, Hyechtia*, and *Puya* left over from my *Bromeliad* days. As you can see, I favor the concept of abundance so my place involves being a lab to experiment with growing various plants, a garden for beauty and relaxation, as well as a small home nursery and propagation space. I am especially fond of anything with fragrance and was delighted to find many Senecios and some *Albucas* are wonderfully fragrant, although I wish all of mine were but, alas, some are not.

I have close to a ¼ acre. The front yard has the more mature plants, especially *Aloe* and *Agave*, and I hope the *Aloes* will still be in bloom. The back yard is a large collection mostly of succulents in pots, of which I've been propagating, although I have a few newer beds on the upper slope. I plan on beginning to hybridize soon as it will be fun to see what happens. Much of my yard is a lab rather than a landscaped garden. To that end I am trying mesembs in the landscape as I find the changing colors of *Cheriodopsis* fascinating and I can imagine mass plantings of *Faucarias* and others.

I am sure there will be weeds around as my place is far from immaculate. In fact, it is somewhat Darwinian in approach although I work on increasing my ability to grow culturally demanding plants which for me mean some mesembs and anything with spines (since I tend to like to water—but the tiny South American *Opuntias* have been calling out to me lately). I even have managed to grow a few *Echinopsis*.

Please feel free to come by. I would love to chat plants with you, and although most of mine are labeled I am eager to learn the names of the ones that I do not know



(labeled with sp. for species until I can get them properly identified) and to correct any mislabeled ones.


