## succulents save homes!

Pam Badger submitted this enlightening email from Debra Lee Baldwin concerning the October wildfires:

Last week, Suzy Schaefer, owner of the garden on the cover of my book, *Designing with Succulents*, emailed me: "Succulents saved our home. The fire came within 6 feet of the house, but the garden saved the house from burning."

I went there and saw how wildfire had blackened palms and eucalyptus in the canyon adjacent to the Schaefers' Rancho Santa Fe home and, sadly, consumed a house across the street. A stand of *Aloe arborescens* had shielded the corner of the Schaefer house closest to the canyon; the plant cooked but did not catch fire.

In the south Escondido community of Del Dios, an area hit hard by wildfire, I saw aloes, agaves, jade, ice plants and prickly pear cactus still green near homes reduced to ashes. And no

wonder -- succulents, which by definition are plants with fleshy leaves and stems, are like well-sealed water balloons.



This past week, the Associated Press interviewed me on using succulents for firewise landscaping, and I wrote an article on the subject for the *Los Angeles Times* (Home section, Thurs. Nov. 8).

I'm also pleased to announce that *Designing with Succulents*, which was released in April, is going into its third printing.

### FROM THE CSSA: Promotional Article (2007, No. 2)

The major events on the 2007 Calendar for the CSSA are now past, the CSSA biennial convention in Seattle in late May and the annual CSSA Show and Sale at the Huntington Botanical Garden in late June. The convention, though not well attended, was greatly enjoyed by attendees and was clearly a success in many ways. We can't thank the Cascade Society enough for all they did to make the convention successful. The CSSA Show was the most spectacular in many years and the accompanying sale broke all previous records.

However, the CSSA Journal, lavishly illustrated in full color, keeps appearing every other month and according to recent survey results, it is the most valuable asset of membership for most CSSA members. Journal editor Russell Wagner continues to do a superb job with the Journal and I would like to briefly review the contents of Volume 78 (2006) so all you affiliate club members who don't yet belong to CSSA can see what you are missing by not having your own personal copy.

A feature article in the January-February issue is a special conservation report by Jan Emming entitled "The Threat that Invasive Weeds and Wildfires Pose to Our North American Desert Biomes." Part 2 of this series deals with the Saguaros of the Sonoran Desert, the quintessential North American cactus. The same issue also contains two articles on terrestrial bromeliads (a recent interest of mine), Hechtias in Mexico and Dyckias and other genera in Brazil. These plants fit nicely into any succulent collection.

Much of the March-April issue is devoted to John Lavranos and his legacy of botanical discoveries. A wonderful cartoon of John by Gerhard Marx graces the cover. This issue is traditionally eagerly awaited by subscribers, as it contains the ISI plant offerings for the year.

The lead article in the May-June issue discusses the succulent riches of the Ankarana Special Reserves in Madagascar. Irwin Lightstone discusses new technologies for close-up photography of succulents and Brian Kemble shares some stunning photos of *Agave guadalajarana*. The first article in a new series by Elton Roberts entitled "Home Grown: Cactus Tips from a Master Grower" appears in this issue. This well-illustrated series discusses the horticultural requirements of various (mostly cactus) genera, some of which are notoriously difficult to grow successfully in cultivation.

In addition to another article in the "Home Grown" series, the July-August issue features two articles by Root Gorelick on cactus localities in New Mexico, and a description of an extraordinary new species of *Rhytidocaulon* from Somalia whose flowers have strange spider-web-like hairs across the corona. In the September – October issue we find a delightful South African travelogue by Sue Hakala, winner of a Schwartz travel grant, which allowed her to visit that land of succulent riches for the first time. Another major article in this issue

covers the diverse globose cactus community of a site in Argentina's Cordoba Province. The November – December issue is a special issue twice the size of a normal issue devoted to pendent and cliff-dwelling succulents from all over the world, many of which do beautifully in cultivation in hanging baskets.

Features appearing in most issues include the Research and Conservation Report by Donna Woodward, Succulents on Stamps by Peg Spaete, and book reviews by various authors. A number of important succulent publications were reviewed in the Journal in 2006, including *Ferocactus* by John Pilbeam and Derek Bowdery, *Grass Aloes in the South African Veld* by Charles Craib, *Echeveria Cultivars* by Lorraine Schulz and Attila Kapitany, *Stapeliads of Southern Africa and Madagascar* by Peter Bruyns, *Teratopia: the World of Cristate and Variegated Succulents* by Gordon Rowley, and *The New Cactus Lexicon* by David Hunt and others. All of these volumes are valuable additions to anyone's succulent library.

Hollywood 'banks' on its stars...Clint, Denzel, Meryl, Angelina, Forrest, Antonio, Julia and Jerry. In November, Jerry Seinfeld's "Bee Movie" earned \$26 million in one week's ticket sales. It's not unusual for \$10-20 million to be paid a 'star' for a single performance. And the individual cost to attend one of these megamillion dollar blockbusters at Landmark, Pacific or AMC theaters? A whopping \$8-10 is the admission price for an approximately 110 minute movie. For additional theater profits and consumer enjoyment there's also the \$3.75 diet Coke and the \$5.75 container of popcorn. Yikes, approximately \$20 for, at most, 2 hours of entertainment. And, if you're very lucky, the movie was worth the cost. But, was it really good value?

Now consider the SDCSS.... We have our 'stars' too! Mark, Chris, Collette, Peter, Bill, Chris (another) Jean, Susan, Allen, Terry... and MORE!! Plant sales on a stellar month for members can reach several thousand dollars. And the sale of sales/show of shows in June takes in almost \$30,000 for members and vendors. Monthly meeting attendance often reaches 100. And the program starts as early as 10 AM for those hoping to 'score' a succulent that's not in their collection...and entertainment continues 'til almost 4 PM---5 hours of purchasing, business meeting, plant of the month, brag table, benefit drawing, professional power-point presentations (exotic plants/locations), and the exchange table, too! Oh, and virtually complimentary sugar-highs at the 'regalia' table, too! And, the price of admission to this entertainment? Yearly dues: \$15. Divide by 12. That's \$1.40 per monthly event (even less when member parties are factored in). Definitely worth the cost; definitely good value!!

But it seems that I've over looked the <u>salaries</u> of SDCSS 'stars.' Our meetings are 'directed' by dedicated, devoted, delightful pros. At the recent special executive board meeting, 4 hours were spent reviewing and refining the "By-laws." There are monthly board meetings, lasting hours. Organizational committee meetings to assure that speakers/presentations are assigned monthly, etc. Lots of ETC. It's a second or third job for many of our officers and board members. What is the motivation? Certainly, part of the motivation is the love of cacti and succulents. Another factor has to be the love of the 'community' they've helped to create. Their salaries? Member thanks, smiles, extra volunteers, compliments.

So... lights, camera, ACTION! It's our turn to 'raise their salaries' by remembering to personally say thanks for the first rate entertainment, knowledge and friendship they've provided us in 2007!

PS: And, if you've always wanted to be a STAR, there are numerous opportunities for you to shine by becoming a board member or officer yourself. Volunteer. Share ideas. Help with the 2011 Convention. It's show time!

SDCSS's primary mission is to promote knowledge and enjoyment of this large and diverse group of plants. **The Huntington's Desert Gardens turned 100 years old in 2007:** In 1907, Henry E. Huntington and his grounds superintendent, William Hertrich, planted about 300 specimens of cacti on a half acre hillside on his estate. By 1930, the collection had grown to 12 acres and also included rare succulent specimens from around the world. Today the Desert Garden holds nearly 50,000 plants representing 3,000 specimens. If you have not visited the Huntington Library, Art Collections and Botanical Gardens it is well worth the trip up to San Marino for any plant lover. **Beware of fake tequila:** For the past six years, phony tequila has been infiltrating the marketplace.
