OLDEST PLANT

hose of you who have visited my garden know I have numerous old, large specimens - huge *Dracena dracos*, towering Alluadias, massive Golden Barrels, and Aloes that touch the sky. On several occasions, visitors have inquired "which is the oldest plant?" They are surprised when I show them a relatively small Mammillaria. This is a plant with a history!

In the early 1970's, not long after we discovered our mutual love of cactus, my husband, Lee Badger, and I started a wholesale cactus business. Living in San Francisco during this time, plant stores were popping up in every neighborhood. Little store fronts crammed with hanging pathos, rubber trees, colorful coleus and numerous other house plants seemed to be on every other street. Scouring these stores in search of cactus proved futile. Lee, who had lived in San Diego for years and had many friends still living there, started looking for cactus and succulents on his visits. During his search for plants he met Bob Taylor (a founding member of SDCSS) who began selling him plants to bring back to The City. As Lee took the plants around to the plant stores, the merchants went wild - something new to bring people into their shops. Soon Bob Taylor was running low on plants to sell Lee and told him about Hans Britsch and Western Cactus—this started a boom in our business newly named "Cactus Kid." Lee began making monthly trips to Vista, returning with a Chevy Carryall packed with banana boxes filled with bare root cactus. By this time we were making planter boxes out of redwood bender board and planting up the cactus in the garage of our rented flat. Once planted, we would drive around to the various shops and sell them - it was lots of work and tons of fun.

"The Cactus Kid"!

Back to the original question about the oldest plant. When Lee would visit his friends in Pacific Beach he would pay a call to Joey at "Hairshapes," sometimes getting a haircut. In talking about the Cactus Kid business, Joey said he would like a cactus for his shop window. On his next trip south, Lee took Joey a sweet little Mammillaria spinosissima, neatly staged in one of our redwood boxes.

In 1976, Lee and I went on an adventure which took us to Nicaragua for a few years—leaving the Cactus Kid business and the retail store which had grown from it-to grow succulents in Central America. If you remember any news from the late 70's, a civil war began brewing in Nicaragua necessitated our eventual return to California in 1979. Settling back in San Diego (as my home town of San Francisco was too cold after being acclimated to Central America) we ended up at our home in Spring Valley. We had gone back to visit Joey and get haircuts, and noticed the Mammillaria overflowing it's

box in the window. Joey, who was doing some remodeling and had young children, offered the plant back to us. When we built the current landscape the Mamm found its home in the ground. Now, 50 years later it is still thriving —the oldest plant in my garden.

If you look closely, to the upper right of the plant you can see the ancient stems left as the Mammillaria grew.

Home sweet home!






