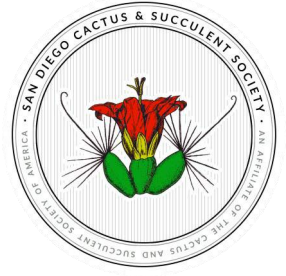

PLANT OF THE MONTH: AVONIA

AVONIAS: A SHORT STORY ABOUT A SMALL GENUS OF TINY PLOANTS

Raise your hand if you've killed an *Avonia quinaria*. (My hand is raised!) When I joined SDCSS I learned what a "three strikes plant" is. This one is mine. Hopefully the following information will be helpful in keeping the next one alive - for all of us!

DESCRIPTION

Avonias are dwarf perennial plants that originate in Southern Africa. They are described as having elongated stems radiating from either a hidden main stem or partly underground caudex. The stems have small green leaves that are nearly entirely concealed under dense sheaths of overlapping white stipules or scales. They have 3 celled capsules that split longitudinally to dehisce (gape or burst open), releasing winged or naked seeds. They are in the Family Portulacaceae and I was able to find 17 described species in this genus, however there may be more out there but the literature is scattered at this time. Most produce a flower with 5 petals. They grow in winter and summer rainfall areas and are very slow growers.

HISTORY

Avonias were previously grouped in the genus *Anacampseros*. In 1992 Maïke Gerbaulet divided the genus *Anacampseros* into two subgenera of *Anacampseros* and *Avonias*. Then in 1994 Gordon Rowley reviewed the literature and elevated *Avonia* to its own genus because *Anacampseros* has fleshy exposed leaves and *Avonias* have minute leaves hidden under white stipular scales. The purpose of these scales has a few theories. For camouflage to appear as bird droppings, to blend in with the quartz rocks where many are

found, and/or perhaps the scales are there to protect the delicate leaves from the sun as these plants are typically found in full sun and very arid climates. It has been noted however that they do not depend on this camouflage for survival because they often grow out in the open where goats frequently graze. Such small but mighty Avonias!

CULTIVATION CARE TIPS

Avonias grow in areas of low rainfall and low humidity so it is suggested to water around every 10 days in spring and fall, and only occasionally during winter as long as they remain in bright light and humidity stays low. In general, the less light they get, the less water they should get. You can also observe them and water only when they are growing and let them stay dry the rest of the year. Avonias prefer particularly well draining soil and extremely bright light. Full to mostly full sun is best. They can withstand some frost if the humidity is low, but high humidity will kill them more than the cold will.

Avonias are prone to mealy bugs so keep a close eye on them. They may be more sensitive to insecticides. So perhaps using less chemical methods is better like dish soap, or diluted isopropyl alcohol. However, I used Neem Oil spray on my *A. quinaria* before I read this information and it seemed to do ok. (But don't listen to me!) In cultivation Avonias seem to be happy in a smaller pot, so don't

overpot them. In nature they grow alongside baby toes or *Fenestraria* so care would be similar to these plants.

A FEW FUN FACTS

A. rodesica and *A. papyracea* are used by native people in traditional beer making, and *A. ustulata* is used in beer making and as a yeast substitute. With the small size and slow growth of these plants, that must be some special beer!

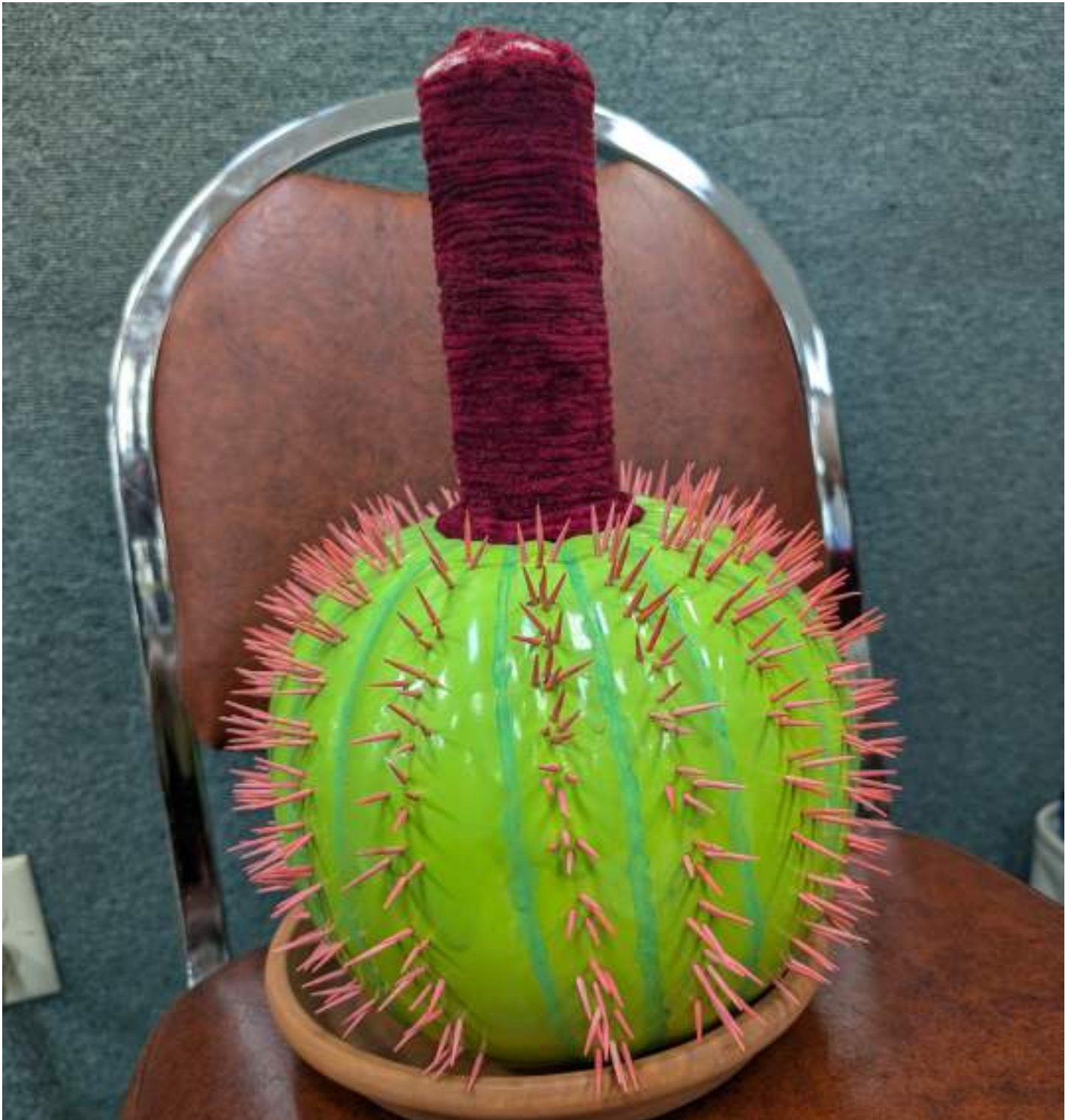
