oin us Saturday, August 6th for our meeting and speaker: Kevin Alison on "Preventing Plant Poaching and Extinction: Conservation Strategies for Dudleya."

Our Program: The genus Dudleya is a charismatic group of native succulents with many rare species across California and Baja. Recent popularity has attracted poachers who uproot these plants to supply demands internationally. Kevin will describe traditional and advanced propagation methods (such as plant tissue culture, Micropropagation) to produce large amounts of select Dudleya species ethically. This project aims to deflate the price incentives for poachers and provide agencies with an additional tool for conservation.

Our Speaker: Kevin Alison is the Production Manager at Tree of Life Nursery, a native plant nursery in San Juan Capistrano. Kevin holds degrees in Horticulture, Natural Resource Management, and recently achieved a Masters in Conservation and Restoration Science (MCRS) at U.C. Irvine.

UPCOMING CSSA WEBINAR

Join the CSSA for their webinar about Plants in Arid Patagonia with speaker **Marcela Ferreyra** on Saturday, August 6th at 10:00 a.m. PDT.

Patagonia is the southernmost region in Argentina. The most remarkable feature in this territory is the Andean range that runs all along the West side from the North to South. The mountains, under a humid and cold climate, have luxurious forests on the slopes and alpine vegetation on their tops. Far from the mountains, the Extra-Andean Patagonia extends itself till the seashore showing a contrasting landscape, very arid and warm. These changes in the environmental conditions produce a remarkable diversity of plants. Patagonia is home to a quarter of the species in all the country.

This lecture will present Patagonia in general, very briefly, and will focus on the Extra-Andean Patagonia Plants displaying the most beautiful shrubs, perennial and cactus ordered by colors.

Short Bio: Marcela Ferreyra is a biologist, teacher, and botanical tour guide. Her activities have always been linked to the flora of Patagonia and to environmental education.



She was professor of Vascular Plant Systematics at the National University of Río Negro in Bariloche. She has taught Flora of Patagonia in Tourism and Mountain Guide training courses and Natural Sciences in the Institute of Teacher Training of Bariloche, among other institutions. Today she is retired from formal education.



OUR FORGOTTEN LITTLE FRIENDS LEDEBOURIA, DRIMIA & DRIMIOPSIS

Ledebouria, Drimia and Drimiopsis are three genera of semi succulent, deciduous or mildly evergreen bulbs that are all part of the same family *Asparagceae*. These cute little gems are constantly being classified from one genus to another, at one point all being under the genus Scilla. Ledebourias are the most commonly known members of the three because of *Ledebouria socialis* and its many cultivars. Referring to those cuties you see in those 2" and 4" pots on the show sales tables with the long pointed green or silver green leaves with dark green spots. Some cultivars come with no spots, faint spots,

All three have similar growth requirements with most being native to southern Africa and Madagascar. Most are in areas of summer rainfall, which means they are at their best here in early spring and summer. There are a few exceptions. They are happy with a welldraining cactus and succulent mix. All prefer bright light in cultivation, too much shade will make them leggy. They all tend to not have any major pest issues.


Ledebourias are the most commonly known members of the three because of *Ledebouria socialis* and its many cultivars. Referring to those cuties you see in those 2" and 4" pots on the show sales tables with the long pointed green or silver green leaves with dark green spots. Some cultivars come with no spots, faint spots, or even variegated. Once you find a place that they are happy, they will quickly fill their pot. With most of them the flowers are identical in appearance, inflorescence with small whitish flowers with purple stamens. This genus does have some odder members. One of those is *Ledebouria crispa* with crinkly long leaves and miniature growth, to grow this one make sure that the bulbs are above ground, and no water in cold temperatures or it will rot.

Drimias are more known for some of the garden relatives, such as the Giant Sea Squill. Unlike the Ledebouria, they have some members living in Asia and the Mediterranean. The most recent lumped many small genera under this genus. Most put out flowers in a raceme, and go deciduous. Even this genus has oddballs. First one is Drimia anomala. It is definitely anomalous, with clusters of small bulbs with one round tubular leaf that stays evergreen. Another one is Drimia haworthioides, named for the bulb's Ledebouria and resemblance to Haworthias, and is grown exposed to show it off. Leaves are small, strap like and deciduous. Another oddball is Drimia intricata, formerly in Schizobasis, with onion like bulbs and threadlike leaves growing with tiny single flowers.



Last but not least are the **Drimiopsis**. These little guys are geophytes found in South Africa. They are winter deciduous, with basal leaves of oval shape of green color, some with dark green spots. Their flowers are different than the others, resembling more in appearance the look of grape hyacinths. Easy to grow, but not seen much except for *Drimiopsis maculata*.

For those who love variegated, two genera do have them. Drimiopsis. Ledebouria has the slow-Ledebouria 'Juda'. socialis Drimiopsis has three: Drimiopsis saundersiae 'Sunny Smile', Drimiopsis maculata, in yellow or white, and Drimiopsis kirkii.


